Location: From Bethune follow the signs for Armentieres until you are on the D171. Continue on this road through Essars and Le Touret village. Approximately 1 kilometre after Le Touret village and about 5 kilometres before you reach the intersection with the D947, Estaires to La Bassee road, the Cemetery lies on the right hand side of the road. Located at the east end of Le Touret Military Cemetery is the Le Touret Memorial, commemorating over 13,000 men who fell in this area before 25 September 1915 and who have no known grave.

Historical Information: The Cemetery was begun by the Indian Corps (and in particular by the 2nd Leicesters) in November, 1914, and it was used continuously by Field Ambulances and fighting units until March, 1918. It passed into German hands in April, 1918, and after its recapture a few further burials were made in Plot IV in September and October. The grave of one Officer of the London Regiment was brought in in 1925 from a position on the Estaires-La Bassee road near "Port Arthur", and the 264 Portuguese graves of March, 1917 and April, 1919 were removed to Richebourg-L'Avoue Portuguese National Cemetery after the Armistice. There are now over 900, 1914-18 war casualties commemorated in this site. The graves of three men of the King's Liverpool Regiment, which were destroyed by shell fire, are now represented by special headstones. The Cemetery covers an area of 7,036 square metres and is enclosed by a low brick wall.

Cemetery: ARNHEM OOSTERBEEK WAR CEMETERY, Netherlands Grave Reference/Panel Number: 3. B. 16.

Location: Arnhem is in the eastern Netherlands. Oosterbeek lies 7 kilometres west of Arnhem on the road to Wageningen. From the Utrechtsche Straatweg, turn on to the Stationsweg heading for Oosterbeek Station. At the railway station, turn right on to Van Limburg Stirumweg. The entrance to the cemetery is a short distance along this road opposite the town cemetery.

Historical Information: On the 17th September 1944, the British 1st Airborne Division began landing West of Arnhem in order to capture and hold the bridges over the River Rhine as part of 'Operation Market Garden'. A costly battle ensued, which nine days later lead to the remnants of this Division being withdrawn back across the Rhine. After the war, this site was chosen for the burial of casualties from this period and those of later battles in this area. There are now 1700, 1939-45 war casualties commemorated in this site. Of these, 250 are unidentified and special memorials have been erected to a soldier from the United Kingdom believed to be buried in the cemetery, and an officer belonging to the 1st Airborne Division who died a prisoner of war, and was buried in Lingen Cemetery, Germany, but whose grave could not be found. In addition there are 70 Foreign National graves. The majority of these are Poles, soldiers of the 1st Independant



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Polish Parachute Brigade who also landed at Arnhem. The three Non-War graves in the cemetery were Commission employees.

Location: Groesbeek is located 10 km south east of the town of Nijmegen and close to the German frontier. Groesbeek Canadian War Cemetery is 3 km north of the village and 1.5 km east of the main road to Nijmegen. On leaving the A73 motorway at the junction Overasselt-Mook-Groesbeek, follow directions to Mook. Follow direction signs towards Mook War Cemetery. After passing Mook War Cemetery continue to the village of Groesbeek to a set of traffic lights. Turn left at the lights onto Dorpstraat passing through Groesbeek. The road name then changes to Molenweg. A Commission direction sign indicates the right hand turning from Molenweg onto the Zeven Heuvelenweg. 1 km after entering this road lies the cemetery on the right hand side of the road. Within the cemetery is the Groesbeek Memorial, which commemorates by name those members of the Commonwealth land forces who died during the campaign in North-West Europe between the time of crossing the Seine at the end of August 1944, and the end of the war in Europe.

Historical Information: By far the greater number of the men buried in this cemetery were Canadians, and many of them lost their lives in the Battle of the Rhineland, when the 2nd and 3rd Canadian Infantry Divisions and the 4th Canadian Armoured Division took part in the drive southwards from Nijmegen to clear the territory between the Maas and the Rhine, in February and March 1945. Canadian casualties from 8th February to 10th March of that year totalled 5,304. Others buried here died earlier or later in the southern part of Holland and in the Rhineland. Within the cemetery stands the Groesbeek Memorial which commemorates those who died in the final stages of the war in Europe, and have no known grave.

Location: Dunkirk Town Cemetery is at the south-eastern corner of the town of Dunkirk, immediately south of the canal and on the road to Veurne (Furnes) in Belgium. The British War Graves Plot is entered through the columns of the Dunkirk Memorial.

Historical Information: Dunkirk witnessed the landing of British forces in September and October, 1914; it was, throughout the War, a British seaplane base, and later an American Naval Air Service base. It was also a French hospital centre, and the 8th Canadian Stationary Hospital was there from November, 1918 to April, 1919. The ship-building and other activities of the port continued during the war, although it was reckoned that 7,514 shells and bombs, from land, air and sea, fell on the town. During the 1939-1945 War, Dunkirk was the scene of the historic evacuation of the British Expeditionary Force from France in May 1940. There are now over 1,000, 1914-18 and 800, 1939-45 war casualties commemorated in this site. In addition, 4,500 soldiers of the British Expeditionary Force who fell in the 1939-45 campaign, and have no known graves, are commemorated on the Dunkirk Memorial. One grave was brought into the cemetery after the 1918 Armistice from LEFFRINKOUCKE CHURCHYARD, three from ZUYDCOOTE CHURCHYARD FRENCH MILITARY EXTENSION, one from LOON-PLAGE COMMUNAL CEMETERY and one from BOURBOURG COMMUNAL CEMETERY.



Hebblethwaite, **Henry**. Private 235108.1st/4th Bn., Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regt.), who died on Sunday, 25th November 1917. Age 27: Son of Wilson and Emma Hebblethwaite, of Wooldale, Thongsbridge, Huddersfield; husband of E. A. Hebblethwaite, of 187, Sunny Bank, Holmebridge, Huddersfield.

Cemetery: OXFORD ROAD CEMETERY, Ieper, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium Grave

Reference/Panel Number: III. A. 20.

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Location: The cemetery is located to the North East of the town of Ieper. From the station turn left and drive along M.Fochlaan to the roundabout, turn right and go to the next roundabout. Here turn left into M.Haiglaan and drive to the next roundabout. Here turn right into Oude Veurnestraat, this then changes into Diksmuidseweg and Brugseweg drive along this road to the traffic lights. Straight over the lights to the end of the road. At the T junction turn left (still Brugseweg) and continue along this road through the village of Sint Jan (N313). After the village you come to a fork in the road, take the right hand fork and the cemetery is 50 metres along on the right hand side.

Historical Information: Oxford Road was the name given to a road running behind the support trenches, from a point West of the village of Wieltje South-Eastwards to the Potijze Zonnebeke road. Plot I is the original cemetery. It was used by the units fighting on this front from August, 1917, to April (and in one case June), 1918; that is, during the greater part of the advance known as the Battles of Ypres, 1917, and for six months afterwards. Meanwhile another cemetery, known as Oxford Road Cemetery No. 2, had been started close by in October, 1917, and contained, by April, 1918, 255 graves. It is now Plot V of Oxford Road Cemetery. After the Armistice, Plots II, III and IV were made by concentrating the scattered graves from the battlefields East and South-East of Ypres. There are now over 850, 1914-18 war casualties commemorated in this site. In three cases a special memorial has been erected to a soldier whose individual grave in the cemetery cannot be identified. The 18th Hussars recorded on a wooden memorial in Plot I, Row N, the names of an officer and 27 non-commissioned officers and men who fell on the 13th May, 1915, during the Battle of Frezenberg Ridge. The cemetery covers an area of 4,412 square metres.

Cemetery: FLORENCE WAR CEMETERY, Italy Grave Reference/Panel Number: X. D. 8. Location: Take the A1 Rome to Milan road and exit at Firenze Sud. Follow the road SS 67 towards Pontassieve and Arezzo. Florence War Cemetery stands on the north bank of the River Arno about 5 kilometres east of Florence. The cemetery is permanently open and may be visited anytime.

Historical Information: Florence, which was taken by the Allied forces on 13th August, 1944, was the centre of the Arno line and the point from which the attack on the German Gothic Line defences in the Apennines was launched. The site for the war cemetery was selected in November 1944, and the burials consist of casualties from the hospitals established in and around Florence. The greater part of those who are buried in the war cemetery lost their lives in the fighting in this area from July to September, 1944. There was, near Florence, another cemetery known as Arrow Route Cemetery. When it proved impossible to secure that site permanently, the 83 graves were moved into Florence War Cemetery; the men who lie in these



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graves were killed during the fighting in the Apennines during the winter of 1944-1945. There are now over 1,500, 1939-45 war casualties commemorated in this site. Of these, nearly 20 are unidentified.

Memorial: YPRES (MENIN GATE) MEMORIAL, Ieper, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium Grave Reference/Panel Number: Panel 39 and 41

Location: Ypres (now Ieper) is a town in the Province of West Flanders. The Memorial is situated at the eastern side of the town on the road to Menin and Courtrai, and bears the names of men who were lost without trace during the defence of the Ypres Salient in the First World War.

Cemetery: VLAMERTINGHE MILITARY CEMETERY, Ieper, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium Grave Reference/Panel Number: I. B. 20.

Location: Vlamertinge Military Cemetery is located 5 Km west of Ieper town centre, on the Hospitaalstraat, which is a road leading from the Poperingseweg. (Connecting Ieper to Poperinge). (* Vlamertinge is the modern spelling of Vlamertinghe). From Ieper town centre the Poperingseweg (N308), is reached via Elverdingsestraat then straight over two small roundabouts in the J. Capronstraat. The Poperingseweg is a continuation of J. Capronstraat and begins after a prominent railway level crossing. On reaching the village of Vlamertinge the cemetery is located on the Hospitaalstraat, which is the second right turning after the village church. The cemetery lies 50 metres along the Hospitaalstraat on the right hand side of the road.

Historical Information: Vlamertinghe Military Cemetery was started by the French troops in Belgium in 1914. The Cemetery was used by fighting troops and Field Ambulances. It was very carefully tended by them until June 1917, when further extension was forbidden and burials practically ceased as the adjoining land was claimed for a Military railway. It is remarkable for the care with which men of the same unit were buried side by side if they fell about the same time; for the very high proportion of graves of Territorial units; and in particular for the presence of nearly 250 Lancashire Territorial graves in plots IV, V and VI. During the early months of 1917 the 55th Division, whenever it was possible, brought their dead from the front for burial here. There are now over 1,000, 1914-18 and a small number of 1939-45 war casualties



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commemorated in this site. The Cemetery covers an area of 6,875 square metres and is enclosed by a terrace wall on the road frontage and on the other three sides by a stone kerb.

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Hebblethwaite, **Stephen Frank**, Lieutenant, H.M.S. Glorious, Royal Navy, who died on Sunday, 9th June 1940. Age 36.

Memorial: LEE-ON-SOLENT MEMORIAL, Hampshire, United Kingdom Grave Reference/Panel Number: Bay 1, Panel 2.

Location: This Memorial will be found on the main sea front, sited on Marine Parade West, approximately half a mile west of the town centre. The principal base of the Fleet Air Arm, Lee-on-the-Solent, Hampshire, was chosen as the site for the Memorial to the men of that service who died during the 1939-1945 War and who have no known grave. The Memorial consists of a rectangular column of Portland stone bearing the inscription: THESE OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE FLEET AIR ARM DIED IN THE SERVICE OF THEIR COUNTRY AND HAVE NO GRAVE BUT THE SEA. 1939-1945. Above the inscription is carved the Naval Crown with wreath and foul anchor. To each side of this central memorial stone is a wall bearing three recessed panels of Westmorland slate, on which are carved the 1,926 names. The panels are protected by a wide canopy. The splayed flanking stone walls of the Memorial enclose a curved terrace approached by a wide flight of three steps and bounded by a low retaining wall. In the centre of this terrace is an inlaid compass emblem composed of a mosaic of Westmorland slate and selected marbles.

Location: The Tower Hill Memorial which commemorates men of the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleets who have no known grave, stands on the south side of the garden of Trinity Square, London, close to The Tower of London. The Memorial Register may be consulted at Trinity House Corporation, Trinity Square (Cooper's Row entrance), Tel: 0171 480 6601, which will be found behind the Memorial.

Historical Information: TOWER HILL MEMORIAL 1914 - 1918 This memorial stands on Tower Hill, London, on the south side of the pleasure garden of Trinity Square. The Memorial consists of a vaulted corridor 21.5 metres long, 7 metres wide and 7 to 10 metres high. It is open at each end. It has three wide openings at the front and back, in which are placed pairs of columns. It rises in the middle in rectangular blocks. It is built of Portland stone finished with a
